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National Organ and Tissue Donation Awareness Week April 17-23, 2016

There are many national and provincial activities being held to bring awareness to tissue and organ donation during National Organ and Tissue Donation Awareness Week April 17-23, 2016.

The #48in48 campaign is a national registration drive that is occurring in partnership with Global TV using the campaign tag line and hashtag #48in48. It is similar to a telethon but rather than money, people are asked to register their decision to donate organs and tissues.

The drive focuses on directing people to the website LiveOn.ca where they will find a map of Canada. When they select their province they will be directed to a site that informs them how to register their decision. The goal is for 48,000 Canadians to register their decision to donate between **April** 18 - 20,2016.

52% of Nova Scotians have registered their decision to donate however there are over 4,000 Canadians are on the waiting list for organ transplants and, sadly, hundreds die every year waiting.

Remember one organ donor can improve or save the life of up to 8 patients and a single tissue donor can help improve or enhance the lives of as many as 75 patients.

GETTING TO KNOW YOU

At the age of 12 the conversation of organ and tissue donation became a large portion of my family's daily conversations. It was at this age I had a family member who was born with a liver condition and within days of his birth it was evident he needed a liver transplant. This was new conversation that spanned many levels of the family tree. We watched during the first year of his life his medical condition deteriorate, and the conversation of what will happen if he does not get the opportunity for a transplant.

They were big conversations and scary as well for a 12 year old, and little did I know at that time that they would greatly influence my life and career as a nurse. Today he is 24 and has proudly taken care of his gift of life. This family event was certainly the moment I not only became aware of organ and tissue donation and became a donor, but it was also the moment that influenced my volunteering as an adult.

My goal is to help others understand the amazing process and opportunity of organ and tissue donation. I currently assist with educating my colleges as a co-facilitator

in the Meaningful Donations Workshop and participate on the Cape Breton Organ and Tissue Donation Team in my hospital. I have also used my own life experience as an inner strength when speaking to grieving families and approaching them for donation.

Cape Breton Conference – April 20, 2016


"Offer Donation: Every Time, at Every Opportunity, to Every Potential Donor and Family" has been the focus of the annual day-long conferences held in Sydney for the past six years and hosted by the former Cape Breton District Health Authority. This year's conference, being held on April 20, 2016, focuses on educating frontline and auxiliary health care staff on all aspects of organ and tissue donation both clinical and personal. Over the past six years several hundred staff have participated in the event and the previous conference evaluations were overwhelmingly positive.

Topics this year include: new advances in cornea retrieval, end of life conversations and the emergency department experience, the approach for donation and our aboriginal families, a family's experience with Donation after Cardiac Death donation, 2016 accreditation standards in donation, a kidney transplant recipient, and Canadian Blood Services and what is on the National horizon. Hearing very personal stories from organ and tissue donor families as well as recipients themselves share the importance of donation from the perspectives of those who gave and those who received. Feedback from the participants in the past stressed the importance of these presentations and how it shaped their practice in their clinical care areas.

We are privileged every year to speak at this tournament in his memory and feel a responsibility to make sure people understand we asked for him to be a tissue donor in Maine and wanted to make sure his life was honored and his decisions in life to be a donor were honored. Every year one of his teachers, The Honourable Leo A. Glavine comes to honor both his memory and his donation. Leo has not only fond memories of David growing up as a student, he had worked with him on community projects and he has a passion for organ and tissue donation. He never turns down the request to stand beside me as we talk about David and his Legacy of Life.


